THESE WILL GOVERN.

Rules Adopted by the School Board for Examinations of Applicants for Positions as Teachers.

Hereafter the examinations for positions as teachers in the public schools of this city will be held under the direction of the board of education...

Section I.—The board of examiners shall consist of the superintendent and three other persons to assist him...

Section II.—The board of examiners shall report to the board of education on a blank to be provided for that purpose...

Section III.—Any person who shall have passed a satisfactory examination in accordance with the report of said board of examiners shall be eligible to employment as a teacher...

Section IV.—The board of education will grant diplomas of certificates, denominated respectively Principals' certificates, assistants' certificates, high school certificates and special teachers' certificates.

Section V.—Applicants for a principal's certificate will be examined in the following branches:—with Grammar, including language lessons, civil government, including the government of Missouri; spelling, including word analysis, pedagogy, including methods and government, United States history, geography, reading, including orthoepy, penmanship, arithmetic, mental and written; drawing, vocal music, physiology and hygiene; physical geography; general history; algebra; geometry; elementary physics; elementary chemistry;

Park Commissioners Will Ask for a District Assessment.

AN ORDINANCE TO BE DRAFTED.

The Property in Each District to Be Assessed Five Mills.

It Was Intended to Have the Measure Ready for To-night's Council Meeting—President Meyer Refers to Municipal Extravagance.

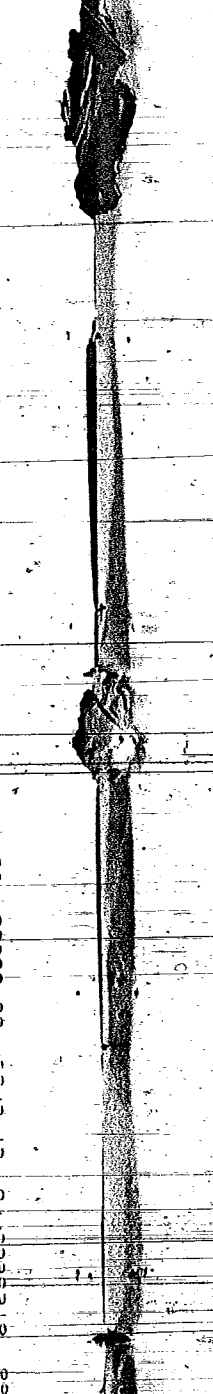

As the abutting property on Independence avenue will have to stand the expense of the removal of curbing and sidewalks, a assistance will be rendered the owners of this property out of the revenue derived from the assessment, which must be used for purposes of adornment and improvement and not of engineering, surveying or any preliminary work of this character. President Meyer of the park board, in discussing the situation, said yesterday:

"A mistake has been made in allowing politics to have anything to do with the treatment of the board." In all cities where there are park boards they are entirely free from politics, as they ought to be. There is nothing new in the interpretation of the charter provisions to the effect that the board of public works could complete the work begun by the board of park commissioners, but the expression of the opinion in accordance with provisions which have never been denied, shows that the administration is unfriendly to the board and has not treated it fairly. I do not mean that the mayor personally is unfriendly, but the persons who manipulate the financial affairs of the city. None of the other departments were cut down, but any business man knows that the nominal sum asked by the board could have been spared by trimming down the other departments. The cost of running the city is excessive. I do not say that the present administration is squandering money; the inheritance from former administrations and other causes have combined to increase the cost of running the city. In the board of public works department alone the enormous sum of \$135,000 was spent last year for salaries.

"The park board does not propose to swamp the city with wild and ill-timed schemes for improvements. Every street will not be declared a boulevard and the cost of establishing and maintaining parks and boulevards contemplated by the board will not be burdensome. The giving of the modest sum asked by the board would accentuate the desire of the city for improvements. Any positive hostility to the board is ill-advised from every standpoint.

"It is only partially true that the preliminary work of establishing parks and boulevards is borne by the general fund and the board of public works. The park board must pay for all the engineering work, all surveys and all the work of this sort which is not chargeable to the district, and only a small portion of which can be charged to the city. As business men, we cannot do work that costs money without money. In my personal business 3,000 men are employed and \$15,000,000 handled yearly. Mr. Armour is equally well posted as to the cost of running establishments and what all kinds of work cost. We have discussed this question carefully together and we have arrived at the conclusion that much of the revenue of the city is spent in a manner which is not economical and that it costs far more to run the city than it should."

teach in the board of education, will be held under the direction of the board of education, and the following rules, recently adopted, will govern:

"Section 1.—The board of examiners shall consist of the superintendent and three other persons to assist him, who shall be appointed annually before the close of schools, each of whom shall be paid at a rate per diem for the actual time employed as such examiner as may be fixed at the time of such appointment.

"Section 2.—Said board of examiners shall report to the board of education on a blank to be provided for that purpose, on the result of the examination of each applicant, giving the grades of subject and general average. Said reports shall be filed and preserved by the secretary of the board of education.

"Section 3.—Any person who shall have passed a satisfactory examination in accordance with the report of said board of examiners shall be eligible to employment as a teacher, and in case of employment as such a certificate of qualification shall be issued, to be signed by the president, countersigned by the superintendent, and attested by the secretary with the official seal of the board of education. All certificates shall be numbered and the record thereof kept by the secretary of the board of education. With each person employed as a teacher a contract shall be drawn, and shall specify the number of the certificate held by such teacher, the length of time employed and wages per month to be paid; shall be signed by the teacher and the president of the board, and attested by the secretary with the official seal affixed. Such certificates or contracts may be revoked at any time for immorality, incompetency or violation of any of the rules and regulations of the board.

"Section 4.—The board of education will grant classes of certificates, denominated respectively—Principals' certificates, assistants' certificates, high school certificates and special teachers' certificates.

"Section 5.—Applicants for a principals' certificate will be examined in the following branches, to-wit: Grammar, including language lessons; arithmetic; spelling, including word analysis; pedagogy, including methods and government; United States history; geography; reading, including oratory; penmanship; arithmetic, mental and written; drawing; vocal music; physiology and hygiene; physical geography; general history; algebra; geometry; elementary physics; elementary chemistry; school supervision; English literature.

"Section 6.—Applicants for assistant certificates shall pass upon the first twelve branches. Applicants for principals' substitute teachers shall pass the examination necessary for an assistant's certificate.

"Section 7.—Applicants for high school certificates shall pass upon the first twelve branches and such other branches as they are expected to teach.

"Section 8.—Applicants for special teachers' certificates for ward or high schools shall pass upon all branches they are expected to teach and upon the theory and practice of teaching.

"Section 9.—All certificates first issued to teachers shall be temporary, good for one year, and such teacher shall be entitled to pay without such certificate.

"Section 10.—When it appears that the teacher's work and management are eminently successful the board of education may upon the recommendation of the superintendent, issue a permanent certificate, which shall be in force during the pleasure of the board of education, it being expressly understood that the board of education has the right to order the examination of any teacher upon any topic required to be taught, at such times as the board may deem best.

"Section 11.—One examination shall be held between the 1st and 20th of June, and another during the first week in September each year, and at such other times as the board of education shall direct.

"Section 12.—The board of examiners may, at its discretion, grant certificates to teachers who hold life state certificates.

"Section 13.—The proficiency of applicants as determined by their examination will be on a scale of one to ten. As a condition of receiving a certificate, an average of seven (7) or more as thus determined will be required. For a special certificate an average of eight (8) will be required. Teachers in the high schools must make an average of eight (8) or more in the branches they are to teach. No certificate will be issued to any person whose standing in two of the branches required by law is less than the (5). If an applicant shall fail to pass the examination the record of grades on all branches upon which the applicant has made an average of seven (7) or more may be transferred to a subsequent examination.

"Section 14.—A book of records shall be kept in which the standing of each applicant shall be recorded by the examiners; when not in the hands of the examiners such book shall be kept by the secretary of the board of education."

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**MAYOR AND COUNCIL.**

**They Will Probably Take a Hand in the Appointment Business Tonight.**

The city council will meet this evening in regular session. In addition to regular work connected with the close of the month, the upper house will take action on whatever appointments are made by the mayor. It is not probable that more than one appointment will be made, that of comptroller. The name of the mayor's appointee was sent in a sealed message to the council but owing to the death of the mayor's father, the council adjourned without taking action on the appointment. It is the general belief that the name of Comptroller Holmes will be sent in for reappointment, despite his rejection by the house once. Others think that the name of V. R. Hawkins is written on the slip of paper sent to the council.

It is the opinion of those on the inside that Assessor Keel and Assistant Sanitary Superintendent Waring will be reappointed. Concerning the chances of Superintendent of Buildings Gulick there is a division of opinion with the odds, perhaps, against his reappointment. The guessers are all in the dark regarding the success of candidate for city physician, but the city hall politicians will not bet on the present incumbent, though he is likely to be a dark horse after all, something of a novelty under the circumstances. But Dr. Lewis' friends are making such a strong fight that his name may be sent in to stop the quarreling.

**WILL BE MARRIED YET.**

**Russell Was Not Turned Over to the United States Marshal Who Came After Him.**

Deputy United States Marshal F. M. Marshall, of St. Joseph, arrived in the city yesterday in search of J. H. Russell, who is wanted in Lawson, Mo., on a charge of bootlegging. Russell is in the county jail awaiting a hearing on the charge of assaulting and robbing Irene Berg, proprietress of the Diamond restaurant at 1222 Walnut street, last Friday night. Deputy Marshal Marshall reports Russell as an all-around crook, and says he broke jail at Gallatin, Mo., on April 18, where he was confined on a charge of criminal assault. Neither the Gallatin officers nor the federal authorities will be given possession of Russell until after he is tried for his recent crime in this city.
