BREATHING SPOTS FIRST.

The Park Board on the Improvement of the West Bluff.

It Thinks the Proposed Work Should Not Be Undertaken at the Present Time - An Answer to the Mayor's Letter.

Several days ago Mayor Cowherd addressed a letter to the board of park and boulevard commissioners, in which he suggested the improvement of the West terrace. The board has had the matter under consideration ever since the receipt of the mayor's letter, and yesterday morning the mayor received the following letter from the board, in which the board pronounces against the improvement, at least until there may be established a few breathing places for the recreation and enjoyment of the middle classes, which the board thinks should be considered first:

"DEAR SIR:—Your communication of the 15th inst., in which you recommend the improvement of the west bluffs, was received and has had our attention.

"The desirability and advantage of the project referred to, at a cursory glance and without careful inquiry into all conditions, seems so obvious that this particular improvement has been urged by many citizens during the past ten years. Under the circumstances it was natural that the project should have been one of the first to be considered by our board, and that the attention of our advisory landscape architects, Messrs. Olmsted & Co., was called to the same upon their first visit to the city.

"When the women gave us their opinion that a rational and permanent improvement, in order to be in full harmony with the situation and conditions to be met, would partake of an architectural character, rather than exhibit the art of the landscape gardener, and on account of the very unstable condition of the soil and of the rocks on the west bluffs, expensive retaining walls would probably be indispensable.

"This board, after a careful study of the project and of park improvement throughout the city generally, could not help but arrive at the conclusion that the greatest need of this city was the possession of a reasonable number of breathing spots and places of quiet recreation in those sections most densely populated and principally occupied by our less well-to-do citizens. For this class, who are most in need of quiet and healthful recreation, our city does absolutely nothing. The well-to-do can afford to keep carriages and enjoy country drives, or they can leave the city during the heated term; the middle class can enjoy cable rides, and may derive some fancied pleasure, though certainly no recreation, from the cable lines railroad parks; but the great body of our labor population feel the need of quiet, well kept and conveniently located grounds, where after a hard day's work the husband may spend a few pleasant hours in the evening after supper, where the children may play in safety, and where the tired mother can find a few hours of respite from her unbroken round of duties.

"Realizing this demand, which is a most urgent one, and which in the interest of humanity should be as quickly met as possible, we have felt that the people's money should be first used to supply substantial, and needed benefit to themselves before spending money upon a project which, after all, would be largely, if not entirely, mere ornamentation.

"There can be no doubt that the embellishment of the west bluffs would add much to the appearance of our city from the Union depot, where most travelers get their first, and often only, impression of the city. We also believe that at some time this project should be undertaken, but it seems that in justice to our citizens it should be one of the last, rather than the first. The smoke, noise and location of the west bluffs would hardly make them a satisfactory place of recreation, and it is doubtful that the locality would be much visited by citizens generally. At all events, it seems obvious that the main object and result of the improvement would be the embellishment of that id-

 unfair to assess the cost upon the people of the
 West park district alone on the plea of con-
 structing a local park for them. As a matter of
 fact, it is conceivable that the improvement
 may result in disadvantage to adjoining resi-
 dence property, because of the character of the
 people who would be most apt to regularly fre-
 quent the spot. The maintenance of order, the
 preservation of peace and the prevention of im-
 moral practices on the grounds would be costly.

Our board, fully appreciating the characteris-
 tic views from the west bluffs into the busy
 railroad yards, wholesale and manufacturing
 districts of the West bottoms, have had in mind,
 in connection with the park and boulevard im-
 provement of the West park district, the con-
 struction of certain projecting lookouts at
 two especially prominent places along the edge
 of the bluff, which would give to pedestrians, as
 well as to those riding or driving, long and
 sweeping views over that section of our city in
 which is shown, with the concentration of an
 exhibit, the factors upon which the prosperity
 of our city depends.

It may be possible to do something tempo-
 rary, or less expensive, with the west bluffs,
 and possibly it may be wise even now to make a
 full and careful study of the subject. We shall,
 accordingly, give the matter our attention, pre-
 pare full plans and a special and exhaustive re-
 port. We believe, however, that further study
 will only confirm the wisdom of the conclusions
 by which we have so far been guided, and which
 we have taken the liberty to lay before you.

In conclusion, we beg to say that the cost of
 any improvement of the west bluffs should not
 only be borne by the city at large, but should
 be met by the sale of the city's bonds or be paid
 out of the general revenue of the city. The
 means available to the park commission for
 raising money, namely, special taxation, ought
 not, in our opinion, be looked to for such pur-
 poses as the project under consideration. Special
 taxation is justified, and ought to be cheer-
 fully submitted to by the people, where a direct
 benefit clearly results, but in a case such as the
 one under consideration, where the benefit, if
 any, attaches to no property, but is that of the
 whole city as a community, we are very clear
 that the expense should be met by a general
 tax.
