**Clerks From the Land Office Sent to the Cherokee Strip.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—Nine clerks in the general land office have been detailed to survey town-sites in the Cherokee outlet and will leave here in a day or two for that purpose.

**ANOTHER OPENING FEATURE.**

**Old Soldiers Propose to take a Hand in the Matter.**

ARKANSAS CITY, KAN., Aug. 19.—The old soldiers of this city, many of whom have had their pensions cut off in the past six weeks, are now crowding the street corners and agitating the land warrant question. These have no land warrants, claim that down in one corner of their discharge in fine type is a foot note in which it is intimated that the old soldier will be paid a homestead of 160 acres of land, or its equivalent—\$225. Since the "suspension for sixty days" order was issued, the Grand Army finds that it will not be able to get a good many of the suspended ones back on the roll, and it will now probably agitate the land warrant question.

Knowing that the 6,000,000 acres of government land is now at the point of being opened, it proposes to spring this question and attempt to further delay the opening, and be allotted that 160 acres of land mentioned in the discharge. The old soldiers are at present making faces at the young element, who are getting their race horses in trim, and telling them that it's no use, as they propose to get all the good land and what they leave will not be worth running for. This has already put the younger bloods on the lookout, and they are preparing in the case of such an event to go out over the States and buy up land warrants, which can probably be purchased for less than they would have to pay the government for the same land.

**THEY WILL BE COSTLY SEALS.**

**A Well-Posted Officer Says It Will Cost \$1,000 Apiece to Preserve Them.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 19.—"We got the hot end of the stock," said Captain R. D. Evans, naval secretary of the Light House Board, today about the recent decision of the Behring sea matter. Captain Evans spent several years in the Arctic ocean dodging icebergs and catching poachers and is familiar with the by-ways of that sea.

"On every contention," continued Captain Evans, "the United States was beaten, with the single exception of the use of firearms in taking seals, and on this point the regulations prescribed are impracticable of enforcement. The sixty-mile zone limit is valueless in a practical point of view. The region around the Fryloff Islands is overhung with a dense fog, making accurate observations impossible. We will be continually in dispute as to whether, in case a seizure is made, the distance is sixty, seventy or forty miles from the islands. The navy of the United States with the English thrown in could not make an effective patrol about these islands. Poachers which are light craft could slip through the patrol and attack the seals on the islands and in the fog escape without detection. Even if seen raiding the seal

**NO TROUBLE IN NEW YORK.**

**The Big Meeting of the Unemployed Passed Off Without an Incident.**

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—The meeting of the unemployed Hebrews today passed off quietly. There was no trouble of any kind, and the speakers refrained wholly from dealing in inflammatory remarks. There were about 5,000 participants. The objective point of the parade was Union square, where the meeting was held. The measures of the police, which were on an unusual scale, were not needed. Miss Emma Goldman, without hat or bonnet, flitted among the crowd on the platform. Prior to being admitted there she had to promise to the police to contain herself and make none of her usual harangues. Joseph Barrondess spoke in German and English. He counseled his hearers to moderation, and told them they were at liberty to agitate the state of affairs as they stood tending toward a settlement of their grievances, but it must be of a so-called abiding kind of agitation.

Resolutions were adopted calling upon the State authorities to abandon the convict labor system and give the work to the unemployed. There was but one arrest made, and that was a man who, after the meeting was over, refused to move on when ordered to do so by the police.

**DROWNED WITH HER CHILDREN.**

**A Notorious Woman Meets Death in the Waters of the Gasconade.**

JEFFERSON CITY, MO., Aug. 19.—A woman and three children were drowned in the Missouri river, fourteen miles below here, last night. The woman was known as Sis Forter and claimed Callaway county as her home. She led such a life as to cause the authorities at various points to request her to move on. Her last stopping place was Osage City, and being notified to leave there, she employed Frank Lawhorn, a river man, to take her to the mouth of the Gasconade river in a skiff. At Bonnet's mill, while attempting to effect a landing, the skiff was caught in a whirl and carried under a government barge. Lawhorn escaped by seizing a cable, but the woman, Mary, aged 13; Jennie, aged 7, and Bessie, aged 3, were carried under the barge and drowned. None of the bodies have been recovered.

**SEVERE STORM IN DENISON.**

**Wind, Rain and Lightning Play Havoc on All Sides.**

DENISON, TEX., Aug. 10.—A fierce storm struck Denison about 5:30 o'clock this evening and continued for an hour and thirty minutes. The wind was heavy and blew down fences, trees and out-houses. Rain fell in torrents, flooding everything in the city. Lightning struck in every direction. Misses Chloe and Clara Rapining were rendered unconscious on the street, and their condition is critical. Charles Shepley's house was demolished and his daughter and wife, in the second story, were severely burned. An unknown man was knocked from a horse and rendered unconscious. Two children of Engineer Baker are missing and it is feared they are injured.
