**A Sensational Suit Filed in the Court of
Common Pleas.**

A peculiar suit was filed in the Court of

**Mayor Williard Refuses to Sign the War-
rants for the City Officers' Pay.**

Mayor Williard went to Chicago yesterday
morning and the city officers are mourning
his absence. The regular monthly appropri-
ation ordinance was passed at the last meet-
ing and the clerk ordered to issue warrants
for the amounts therein named. In this ordi-
nance were inserted the salaries of the vari-
ous city officers. Mr. Williard was requested
to sign the warrants before he went away,
but refused to comply with the request. He
assigned no reason for his refusal and there
are all sorts of rumors on the street. Some
are to the effect that the city is financially
out of existence, while others contend that
Williard is determined to carry on the fight
between himself and the Council and city
officers.

of the Home for an Immense Sum—

Frances Xavier Kummerle, formerly a
mate of the Soldiers' Home near this
city yesterday filed a suit for damages against
the Board of Managers, demanding to be
paid the sum of \$386,224.33 for wrongs suffered
him owing to his dishonorable discharge from
the Home. Notwithstanding that the
plaintiff's petition presents the strongest evi-
dence of his insanity, the clerk made record

Kummerle is his own lawyer. He is 88
of age. The governor of the Home and

Kummerle is a German. He entered
the Home in 1888 and was dishonorably
discharged last fall. He sums up his
grievances thus:

"For imposition, fraud, extortion,
violence, arrogance, robbery, oppression and
expulsion and libelous slander, \$19,430.

"For defacement of personal property
