

IS BAKER'S TEAM CHAMPION?

THE DECIDING GAME WITH THE K. S. U. ELEVEN DECLARED OFF.

The Baker Men Declare That the Lawrence Men Forfeit the Game by Default.—The State University People Declare That Baker Was Afraid to Play Them—Baker Claims the Championship—Jimmy Furge's Defeat—Results of Yesterday's Races—Sporting News.

BALDWIN, KAN., Nov. 6.—The foot ball game between the teams of Baker university and Kansas State university, which was to be played here tomorrow, has been declared off by the management of the State university foot ball team over the determined protest of the management of the Baker eleven. Both telegraphic and personal protests have been made, but to no avail. This gives the game and the State championship to Baker.

The State University team refused to play because Baker would not agree to Heath and Cornell of Kansas City as umpire and referee, because Heath has been coaching the State University team for the past week. Cornell of Kansas City and McVickers of Topeka were proposed and accepted by the management of Baker, but the Kansas University management refused to agree to them. The forfeit of the game by rock-chalkers gives Baker the championship for the third time in four years.

Baker and Kansas Will Not Play.

LAWRENCE, KAN., Nov. 6.—The return game of foot ball between the Baker and Kansas University teams scheduled for tomorrow at Baldwin was declared off this evening. Baker refused to play unless allowed to name both the umpire and referee. This the university boys refused to do, and the game was declared off.

MISSOURI HAS A WALKOVER.

COLUMBUS, MO., Nov. 6.—Missouri State University eleven defeated the eleven of the Missouri Valley college of Marshall at foot ball here today by a score of 76 to 0. In the first half the university team made eight touch-downs and six goals. In the second half they made five touch-downs, five goals and one safety. The university team was heavier than their opponents who, however, played a good game, fighting pluckily to the last. The Missouri Valley men were weak in team work. A feature of the game was the brilliant playing of Harrison, the crack runner. Young, Anderson, Shawhan and Latt-
