

The operations at the packing houses of Kansas City for the next six months will largely exceed those for the corresponding period in 1892. The temporary depression which this industry experienced during the financial flurry has passed away. All of the plants are increasing their force and are gradually working up to their full capacity. These establishments furnish labor to a vast army of men, and through their employees, numbering many thousands, they disburse an enormous sum of money each month among the merchants of Kansas City. The full resumption of activity at the packing houses now seems to be assured, will exert a highly stimulating influence upon local trade and will bring into Kansas City from outside points a large influx of capital.
