

LOVE VERSUS LYMAN.

The Two Senators at Outs On Legislation.

One Will Obey the Westport Baron, the Other Won't.

Samples of Legislation That the Park and Boulevard Friend Would Have Pass.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 20.—Senator Lyman voted with the republicans in the Ryers contest case. It made little difference for he was the only democrat to do so.

In humble submission to the dictation of the Kansas City Star, Senator Lyman has introduced almost a score of bills, the effect of which will be to very materially amend the charter. Chief ones are as follows:

An act relating to the construction, paving, repaving, macadamizing, constructing sidewalks, etc.; an act regulating parks, sewers, public squares, etc., an act relating to grades, etc. Two of these measures are park and boulevard measures as gratifying to the baron's desires, no doubt, as he could wish. Sharp judgment can be taken under one bill which requires only a majority of front feet owned by residents to make an improvement.

Senator Love will not stand with Mr. Lyman in his attempts to tinker with the charter. He said today regarding Mr. Lyman's boulevard bill:

"The non-resident property owner will have no show at all under the provisions of Mr. Lyman's bill. If I owned 195 feet in a block living as I do at Independence I could not remonstrate against the man having only five feet if he lived in Kansas City and wanted a costly improvement made. This is manifestly unjust."

"Do you think any of these measures will at all benefit Kansas City?" Senator Love was asked.

"I do not think so at this time," he replied positively.
