

AGAINST "LADIES" ENTRANCES.

**W. C. T. U. Proposes a Crusade Against
A Popular Saloon Attachment.**

War against "ladies' entrances" to saloons in this city has been declared by the Women's Christian Temperance union. A plan of campaign against "the little side door" was outlined at the regular weekly meeting of the union yesterday afternoon. Each woman present was instructed to make a note of every saloon she noticed with a private entrance and to report at the next meeting. When a complete census of ladies' entrances has been made the union will search the statutes for means to suppress the evil.

The members of the union say that the wine-rooms attached to many saloons in this city are the means of ruining hundreds of girls and women. As an instance of this one woman at the meeting yesterday told of a young woman of her acquaintance who recently went for an evening drive with her sweetheart. The weather was warm and the lovers dropped into a wine-room for refreshments. The young woman became intoxicated and was unable to return home until 2 o'clock the next morning.

The new South Carolina liquor law was also discussed, and it was the sense of the meeting that no State has the right to sell whisky.

Invitations were accepted by the union to the following lawn socials: At the home of Mrs. Van Horn, Twenty-eighth and Main streets, on the evening of July 24, under the auspices of the women's auxiliary to the Keeley league; at Troost park on the afternoon and evening of July 18, under the auspices of the Good Templars, and at Troost park on the afternoon of August 2, under the auspices of the Suffragists society.
