

ANOTHER "MASHER" ARRESTED.

Frank Edwards Locked Up for Insulting Women at the Junction.

A stout, well dressed man giving the name of Frank Edwards was arrested at the Junction late yesterday afternoon by Robert Dunlop, the big policeman who stands all day at the street crossing. Edwards has a smooth face, florid complexion and hair almost red. He is a frequenter of the grain commission offices in the Board of Trade building, and Policeman Dunlop says that for two months he has spent his afternoons at the Junction, staring at women who pass and accosting and insulting them. It is alleged he spoke to a woman from Cleveland, O., who was passing yesterday afternoon with her husband and when arrested he apologized. When taken to the Central station and searched he refused to put up \$10 and his watch as the bond asked by Captain Branham, but called for W. H. Christie, the saloon keeper, to go his bail. The police were not in the habit of sending for Christie, and so Edwards was cast in the "holdover," from which he was later rescued by P. E. Dwyer, who went on his bond. He will be tried in police court to-morrow.

Policeman Dunlop is always on the watch for "maskers," who, for a time made the Junction an unsafe place for women in the afternoon, and has arrested and convicted half a dozen or more of the professionals, and has driven most of the others away. When a strong case has been made Police Judge Johnson has made it his rule to give heavy fines.
