

TAX ON INCOMES FAVORED.

THE WAYS AND MEANS SUBCOMMITTEE MAKES ITS REPORT.

Messrs. Tarsney and Bryan Have Their Way—The Majority of the Full Committee for the Fiscal-Louisiana Enter Protest Against Free Sugar.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—That an income tax proposition is to be favorably recommended to the committee on ways and means by the sub-committee having the matter in charge, has been definitely decided upon.

So far the great difficulty of the committee has been to reduce the tariff without creating a deficit in the treasury and this has all along been the chief reliance of the income tax men.

ONLY LARGE INCOMES TAXABLE.

The plan to be recommended by the sub-committee leaves most of the details to be settled after the final approval of the policy.

The financial question also seems likely to engage the attention of the ways and means committee.

There are outstanding at this time about 22 millions of two per cent bonds which can be paid at the option of the government.
