BREWERS IN A TRUST.

An Ironclad Compact With Some Queer Provisions.

SALOON KEEPERS RESTRICTED.

Compelled to Choose a Brand of Beer and Stick to It.

They Threaten to Start a Co-operative Brewery or Throw All Their Business Into the Hands of a St. Louis Company.

There is a prospect of lively times ahead in the beer business. The brewers of this city and St. Louis have formed an ironclad trust, and have entered into an arrangement whereby each saloonkeeper in the two cities must choose the brand of beer he wishes to sell to his customers.

For instance, if a saloonkeeper handles one kind of beer and for any reason he desires to change the brand and sell any other, he must pay an increase of \$3 per barrel. But this extra \$3, while it will come out of the pockets of the consumer, does not remain in the coffers of the brewer to which the saloonkeeper changes.

It is paid over to the losing brewer as a recompense for the loss of the privilege of the other brewer. The brewer who loses the trade therefore really does not lose the profit on the beer, the saloonkeeper for the respective royalty, as it were, on every barrel of beer the gaining brewer sells to that particular customer.

But the brewers do not propose to stop at this, and they have agreed not to start any more saloons or refreshment places, except by the plan of or put up any more signs for their customers. Hereafter the saloonkeepers have received many favors of this kind, and they are not likely to stop.

"This pool of the brewers is going to be a bad thing for us, more so than the old pool, well known North end saloonkeeper. As it is now a saloon which has a good trade is good for me, and I shall be glad to take it. If they send their agents round to us to get us to take different kinds of beer from that which we are taking and the brewers who are going to be selling, we shall be glad to take it. The result is their agents spend considerable money with us trying to get our custom and in holding out the kind of beer we have given it to them. I have had a brewer's agent come into my place and spend as much as \$10 at one time trying to get me to take a certain kind of beer.

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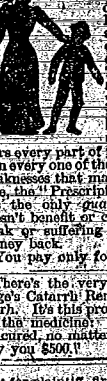
