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Don't forget that this is a Grover Cleveland panic brought on as an "object lesson" to force the issue of more bonds by the government so that the national banks may have a new lease of life. The senators who are so earnestly opposing the scheme are the real friends of the people. Let every one thank them and buy the paper that stoops to vilify them.

A compromise is now the only solution of the long debate in the senate. Silver men may agree to a compromise but that will not end the struggle. The passage of the Missouri compromise in the Fifties led to the disruption of the Democratic and Whig parties.

The Republican party was built out of the radical anti-slavery men of both old parties. So we will see again. The radical uncompromising silver men will get together and in 1896 carry all the southern and western states and brush the eastern states pretty lively. Keep your eyes on the scene and mark THE MAIL'S prediction.

The trouble with the country is monopoly everywhere in everything. The farmer is complaining of low prices for all products. The consumers are equally loud in their complaints as to the high prices of the article, they are compelled to consume. A farmer recently in the city from Bates county says he sold a few days ago at Adrian, Bates county, sixty bushels of as good oats as he ever saw for \$5, just 8 1/2 cents per bushel. At the same time every consumer of oats in this city was paying at least 33 1/2 cents per bushel, four hundred per cent profit on the producers' price before it gets to the consumer. The same is true in regard to almost every product. The five cent loaf of bread is no larger now than it was when wheat was three times as high as it is today. Wheat is selling at 30 cents per bushel in the country. Four and one half bushels of wheat will make a barrel of flour, selling in the market here at \$4.00. One dollar and thirty-five cents only reaches the producers of the wheat. Your bakery trusts and American biscuit company are selling bread and crackers at the same rates that they did when flour was \$8 to \$10 per barrel. Is it fair? And why is it so?
