## LOTS OF LIGHT.

TWO LAMPS FOR ONE BLOCK  
AND NONE FOR ANOTHER.

An Incident That Explains Why the  
"City Dads" Are Now So Hard Up—  
Five Policemen Will Be  
Dropped From the Force.

Citizens in the southwestern portion of the city are considerably amused over the cry of retrenchment in municipal affairs and are wondering why it is that when public money is alleged to be so scarce that two gasoline lamps are placed and maintained at Fairmount and Thirty-first in one block where only one man is benefited. At that point there are two lamps within half a block, one at the corner of Springfield and one in front of Michael Corless' house, 3033 Fairmount, half a block away only from the other.

The citizens also want to know why Terrace street, with twelve or thirteen houses, should have but one light, and they hint at the fact as being due to their being laboring men. Said one of the kickers this morning: "I would like to see a laboring man's property get the same amount of light that is afforded a rich man. If the city fathers can raise the money to provide an extra light for one man, it ought certainly to give the same showing to one dozen residents similarly situated."
