ARGENTINE.

The Question of Opening Public Schools to Be Considered Monday Night.

Next Monday night the School Board will meet to discuss the all important subject, "to keep school or not to keep school." The discussion will be confined to the members of the board and is caused by the condition of the board's treasury, which is empty to the extreme, and has been for three years, although the fact has not been generally known to the public. The conservative members of the board are in favor of opening the schools at the usual time, but others assert that the law will compel them to not contract debts without money in hand to pay for them. At this meeting the dilemma will be thoroughly investigated, and if any feasible plan is suggested it will be adopted. The conservative members are determined to reopen the schools. They claim the advertisement alone would injure the city more than a short term and a large debt. The teachers have already been selected and two more will probably be chosen Monday night to complete the corps.

Another important matter that must be disposed of is the tax-levy, and the length of the term will also be passed upon Monday night. The meeting is well advertised, and much interest is manifested in the outcome.

Although there has been no money in the city treasury for three years, the board's financial condition at the present time is much better. The debt has been reduced \$2,000.

Met Her Bonds and Coupons.

City Treasurer Wiscoskie yesterday remitted to the fiscal agency at New York enough money to pay all bonds and coupons now due. The city's financial credit was sustained better than was expected. Not long ago there was a fear that the payment of the bonds and coupons falling due at the fiscal agency could not be met, but Treasurer Wiscoskie scraped up enough money, to keep up the city's good financial record, and the administration is much pleased.
