

## MISS SQUIRES INJURED.

**Her High Dive at Washington Park  
Almost Resulted Fatally  
to Her.**

Ten thousand people witnessed the thrilling attempt of Miss Madeline Squires at diving from a fifty foot tower into the lake at Washington park yesterday afternoon, and the feat came near resulting fatally to the young woman. Yesterday was Miss Squires' first attempt at high diving and she struck the water flat and face downward and was rendered unconscious. She was rescued by E. S. Ridgeway, a professional swimmer. Restoratives were applied and

she was resuscitated, but she will not be able to repeat the high dive for several days. She says, however, that she intends going into training under the tutorship of Professor Ridgeway, and if she is able, will dive from the sixty-five foot mark next Sunday.

Professor Ridgeway made the prettiest dive from the eighty foot mark ever seen at the park. He is much more graceful than Leuvenmark or any of the professional divers who have given exhibitions here, and he says that he can dive from the 100 foot mark as easily as from fifty feet. There is no preliminary or grand stand play about Ridgeway's work. He simply ascends the tower and makes the headlong leap. He is a Kansas City boy, and says that he learned to dive from an old sycamore tree into the Big Blue not far from Washington park. The park managers are arranging for a diving tournament at the park in the near future, and Ridgeway will challenge all the high divers in the country for a large purse. He will make an eighty foot dive at the park Saturday afternoon.
