SHE WILL TRY AGAIN.

Miss Madeline Squires Determined to Convince the Public That She Is a High Diver.

Miss Madeline Squires, who made an unsuccessful dive last Sunday afternoon, has completely recovered from the effects of her jump, and will to-morrow afternoon attempt to regain her prestige by a dive from a height of sixty feet, ten feet higher than last Sunday's dive. She will not be scared off by the attempts of the humane societies to prevent her diving. She is confident of her ability to make a successful dive, attributing her poor showing to an unfortunate slip that caused her to lose her equilibrium as she was about to make her jump. She has made a number of practice dives during the past week from the twenty and thirty foot platforms, and has improved considerably.

Ridgeway, who bids fair to become the most sensational diver in the country, will put an effective quietus to Leuvenmark's claim that he still holds the world's record, by diving from a height of ninety feet to-morrow afternoon. He is absolutely without fear, and his dives are easier and more graceful than those of the Swede. Leuvenmark has a record of eighty-three feet three and three-quarters inches, so that Ridgeway's dive to-morrow will increase the record by six feet eight and one-quarter inches.
