

## WILL PROBABLY REGISTER.

**Kansas City Chinamen Likely to Obey the Government's Demand.**

The Chinese must register or go is the latest decision of the Treasury department. Internal Revenue Collector Withers received yesterday a supply of registry blanks and instructions to notify Chinamen in Kansas City that they must be registered before May 5, 1894, or leave the country.

Each Chinaman must make affidavit that he was lawfully within the United States in May, 1892, and that he was never convicted of a felony. He must state when he arrived in this country, at what port, his age, occupation, height, color of eyes and complexion. He must furnish two photographs of himself and a credible witness who will swear that his affidavit is correct.

Gam Lee, the most intelligent Chinaman in Kansas City and the spokesman of the Chinese colony here, visited Collector Withers and assured him that every Chinaman would register as soon as they could get photographs. When Gam read the rule which requires his countrymen to register the color of their eyes and complexion, he smiled "in a way that was childlike and bland," and asked:

"Who gottee up?"

He was told that Secretary Carlisle had had a hand in getting up the questions.

"Kiffo a diam flook," he ejaculated. "Chinese eyes and compleckshun alle samee one kind."
