

THE CURE FOR LYNCHING.

Charles H. J. Taylor Has One, and Will Lecture About It.

Mr. Charles H. J. Taylor, the noted negro Democrat of Kansas City, Kan., who was lately appointed envoy extraordinary and minister plenipotentiary to Bolivia by President Cleveland, arrived home from Washington on Friday night. He says he recognizes in his appointment that the intelligence and responsibility of the negro race is to be tested. This is the first time on record that a negro has been sent to a white country in an official capacity. He will remain here but a few days. He is to deliver a lecture on "The Cure for Lynchings" at the Cincinnati law and order convention on the 28th inst. In this address he will set forth what he conceives to be a certain remedy for the outrages on alleged criminals. He proposes that the Federal government shall hold States accountable for lynchings occurring within their borders, and that States, in turn, shall hold counties responsible for the observance of law and order. After his Cincinnati address he will make political speeches in all of the leading cities of the country. He will depart for Bolivia about January 1, 1894.
