**SAY IT IS SINFUL.**

**Christian Endeavor Societies Want All Sunday Exhibitions Stopped.**

(Sunday exhibitions by Chief Hale and members of the fire department must be stopped. This was the expression of more than 1,500 members of various Christian Endeavor societies in the city at a mass meeting held at the First Congregational church last night.

The subject was brought up near the close of the meeting by Mr. C. A. Daugherty, who said that there was a great evil existing in our midst, and one that was sanctioned by our city authorities. The Christian Endeavor bodies had protested against the opening of the World's fair on Sunday, but the exhibitions given by the fire department on Sunday were equally as bad. He said that this was an opportunity for doing practical religious work, and asked that the meeting express its disapproval of these exhibitions, and that a committee be appointed to wait upon the Mayor today and present a formal protest against his action in authorizing these Sunday exhibitions.

Mr. Hughson was seconded by Messrs. R. H. Waggoner, W. O. Thomas and C. L. Hubbell, who made strong speeches against these Sunday exhibitions. Mr. Hubbell also advocated closing butcher shops and grocery stores on Sunday and referred to the recent Sunday closing of barber shops as a victory for God and morality.

A motion was made that it was the sense of the Christian bodies of Kansas City that the Sunday exhibitions of the fire department should be discouraged and discontinued. When the motion was put to a vote 1,500 people stood up. They represented thirty churches and all the evangelical denominations in the city.

A committee consisting of C. A. Hughson, E. M. Henderson, R. H. Waggoner, Judge C. W. Shields, C. W. Dickinson, A. E. Wagner and Rev. C. W. Hawkins was appointed to visit the Mayor and present the protest. They will call upon him to-day.

The mass meeting was called for the purpose of allowing the delegates to the recent Montreal convention to tell about their trip and the proceedings of the convention. Papers were read by Miss Skelton of Kansas City, Kan.; C. W. Little, Miss Mary Drake, Miss Jenkins, S. A. Voorhees and L. L. Roby of Topeka, secretary of the Kansas State League of Christian Endeavor Societies. The programme was interspersed with excellent music rendered by a choir of thirty voices. A number of "Echoes"—extracts from speeches made at Montreal—were also read.
