

THE DALTONS WERE TRUSTY.

Marshal Yoes Writes of His Experience
With the Gang.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 3.—Attorney General Miller being today asked if he had any further information with reference to the truth of the dispatches from Coffeyville, Kan., to the effect that Bill Dalton and Bill Lipsey were acting as deputy United States marshals, said:

"I have word from the marshal of Kansas, of the Western district of Arkansas, Oklahoma, the Indian territory and the Eastern district of Texas, and all deny that "Bill" Dalton or any member of the Dalton family or gang, has been appointed, or been acting deputy United States marshal for any of these districts for more than two years past, and each denies that Bill Lipsey has ever acted under him. Marshal Yoes of the Western district Arkansas says: 'The Daltons were officers under my predecessor. I retained Grat Dalton until May, 1890. Robert and Emmet Dalton acted as posse twice in 1890, assisting in arresting three noted desperadoes. They were all considered trustworthy men until the fall of 1890, when their first unlawful acts begun. None of the gang were employed by me after that time.'

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
