

St. Louis last night having 100,000 feet of lumber, 1,000 sacks cotton seed, 600 bundles staves and about 700 packages sundries.

The Cherokee will arrive to-night from the Ouachita River with 60,000 feet of lumber and lots of sundries. She will enter the trade between here and Memphis as an independent packet, leaving every Friday in command of George G. Keith, with Ed Anshutze in the office.

The steamer Bald Eagle leaves every Wednesday and Saturday at 4 p. m. from foot of Vine street for War Eagle, Milans, Hastings, West Point, Clarksville and way landings. She runs in the grain trade and does a very large freight business, as well as passenger. She is represented by Schwartz & Pappas.
