MRS. POTTER.

What the Newspapers Are Saying About Her Defeat.

The fate of Mrs. Potter in her candidacy for Mayor of Kansas City shows that women will vote, but not for a woman.—St. Paul Globe.

Mrs. Anna Potter, the unsuccessful woman candidate for Mayor of Kansas City, Ks., has achieved political renown on a smaller basis of votes than any other politician now before the public.—Chicago Tribune.

The women of Kansas voted heavily, but they did not support the lady candidates. It is supposed that the latter made the mistake of appearing at the polls in overwhelmingly gorgeous bonnets.—Washington News.

Mrs. Potter, the woman who ran for Mayor of Kansas City, Ks., polled only 25 votes, though 3,000 women went to the polls and voted. Mrs. Potter probably committed the unpardonable indiscretion of appearing in an Easter bonnet which eclipsed the springtime headgear of her constituents.—Chicago Times.

On the whole, the women of Kansas City did themselves credit in repudiating the woman who ran for Mayor of that city.
