

## IN COFFEYVILLE STYLE.

### Desperadoes Raid an Arkansas Town—A Hot Battle the Result.

BENTONVILLE, Ark., June 6.—The bold raid of the Dalton gang on the town of Coffeyville, Kas., was duplicated in part here yesterday afternoon but this time the outlaws escaped with \$10,000 in money. Two of the outlaws were wounded while three citizens were shot, but not fatally.

The outlaws are believed to have been members of the Starr gang from the Indian territory. They came into the town about 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, four on fine horses and two in a light buggy. They dismounted in the rear of the *Sun* office and left one man in charge of the animals.

The other five desperadoes, each carrying a Winchester rifle, went straight to the People's bank. There were President A. W. Dinsmore, Vice President I. R. Hall, Cashier McAndrews and Assistant Cashier Jackson. The bankers were taken completely by surprise. McAndrews was forced to put the gold and currency in the bank into a sack and the silver into another.

Then the robbers marched the bankers in front of them to the place where the horses were standing, Jackson carrying the silver worth \$1,000.

As the party passed the newspaper office Miss Maggie Wood, a printer, opened the door sufficiently to admit Jackson. The latter darted inside and the door was locked and barred before the outlaw in charge could bring his Winchester to bear. Jackson hid in the building and the robbers did not get the \$1,000 he carried.

During all this time the robbers kept up a constant firing, covering the two main streets, but the citizens soon rallied and a general firing was kept up. The robbers mounted their horses, going west, closely followed by Sheriff Galbraith and posse.

Assistant Cashier Jackson was shot in the head, back of the right ear, and also in the left elbow. His wounds are not serious.

Taylor Stone, a farmer, procured a shot gun and fired two shots at the retiring robbers, but was immediately shot down, the ball passing through his left groin.

Tom Baker, a farmer, was shot in the chin, and returned the compliment by wounding the robber. Another of the robbers was wounded by Tom Woolley, drayman.
